

1983 is the Year of the Wild Boar! Join the New Year (Oshōgatsu) celebration from 10 am-4 pm and welcome 1983 with a touch of festive Japanese tradition!

The Japanese people follow a zodiac cycle of 12 years instead of 12 months. Each year honors an animal whose characteristics are said to belong to people born in that year. A person born in 1959, 1971, or 1983, is said to be, like the boar, intelligent, emotional and prolific.

Families are invited to join:

Mochi -- rice pounding -- watch rice being pounded and made into small cakes. Then try a sample!

Origami -- paper folding -- watch paper being turned into animals, birds, flowers and much more.

Omocha -- toys -- play with traditional Japanese folk toys: kendama, cup and ball; koma, top; and lots more games.

Hashi -- chopsticks -- try your hand at mastering a variety of chopsticks.

Nengajo -- New Year's greeting cards -print Japanese symbols onto cards and write wishes for a good New Year. Kakizome -- the year's first writing -- try you hand at calligraphy.

Fuku-warai -- smiling goddess of good fortune-play a game similar to pin-the-tail-on-thedonkey.

Haiku -- the Emperor has thought of the first line of the Haiku. You get to finish it!

Fusen -- paper balloons -- a game played by hitting paper balloons high into the air and trying to keep them there.

**Gyotaku --** fish printing -- make a fish print using real fish.

Hanetsuki -- make your own battledore and shuttlecock and then play this game, which is similar to badminton.
