Course descriptions

AE446 Drawing

Diana Korzenik, Chairperson, Art Education Department, Massachusetts College of Art

Studio work provides opportunities for becoming aware of one's preferred, personal imagery. Students will explore what attracts them (1)in form (via exploration of space and collections in the Children's Museum) and (2)in process, how they prefer to form drawn images. Strategies for teaching drawing will be derived from the studio work.

AE447 Inner Geographies

Lowery Burgess, Professor of Visual Fundamentals, Massachusetts College of Art

Through a variety of media, and specific exercises, readings and references, this course will pursue the progress of labyrinths, gateways and treadings of our creative conscience. This effort of journey and unbinding will lead to ever larger and more deeply rooted prospects for artistic and pedagogical potentials. It will look upon the intense and authentic origins and forces which can infuse art and learning.

AE448 Recycle

Leonard Gottlieb, Recycle Manager, Children's Museum Enormous volumes of materials, both common and exotic, are transformed daily by local industries in the production of consumer goods. Both unassembled individual components and waste products of this production process offer potential as raw material for art. The focus of this course will be to develop strategies for locating and obtaining materials, to visit factories and pursue individual and group projects using the found materials.

AE449 Inventing in Art and Science

Bernie Zubrowski, Science Developer, Children's Museum
Students will pursue individual design projects that employ concepts or properties gained through play/exploration of scientific phenomena; i.e., movement of air, water, bubbles, soapfilm. Students will also design exhibits, programs or kits using scientific/art phenomena.
