



ere's how your community or after-school group can visit the Boston Children's Museum free.

That's right, thanks to a state appropriation funded through the Department of Education, all nonprofit community groups in Massachusetts are admitted free to the museum. If your group hasn't visited us recently, we hope you'll come soon.



xciting exhibits include City Slice, a three-story cross section of a city street and house; the Japanese Home from Kyoto, Boston's Sister City; What If You Couldn't, an exhibit about handicaps; and Grandparents' House. Computers has 12 terminals programmed with games for all ages, and Meeting Ground shows children the ethnic diversity of Boston.



ducational services for adults who work with children are available in the museum's Resource Center: courses, workshops, education kits for classroom use, library materials, and, of course, Recycle, an extensive collection of industrial byproducts and rejects that are sold at nominal cost for use in arts, crafts, and science projects.



eservations are simple. Just call the Reservations Office, (617) 425-6500, preferably at least 2 weeks in advance of your visit. When you arrive at the museum, you'll be asked to sign in with the name of your group and the number of visitors. That's all you need to do. Visits are unstructured and members of your group are free to visit exhibits at their own pace.



uring the school year, groups may visit Tuesday-Friday, 2-5; Saturday and Sunday, 10-5. During July and August, groups may visit daily, 10-6. Reservations are not accepted during Boston school vacations because the museum is crowded and we cannot guarantee an entry time. However, groups are still welcome on a first come, first served basis.



e suggest you plan to spend 1 to 2 hours at the museum, depending on the age of the children in your group. A ratio of at least 1 adult for every 10 children is recommended.



e're on Boston's waterfront at Museum Wharf, 300 Congress Street. From the North, take the expressway (Rte. 3) south to the High Street/Congress Street exit, then third left on Congress Street. From the West and South, take the Expressway north to Atlantic Avenue/Northern Avenue exit, then right over the Northern Avenue bridge and immediate right on Sleeper Street. By public transportation, take the MBTA Red Line to South Station.


